SLIDE 1

- Introduction
- This is the first lesson
- Explain what's going to happen (talk about climate change and the ACE Awards)
- Explain why they're learning about it (climate education is vital and the school is part of the ACE award run by the Regional Youth Climate Assembly & Calderdale Youth Council)
- Information about joining those groups is at the end

SLIDE 2

- What is climate change?
- Make sure to emphasise that its the average change in weather conditions

SLIDE 3

- Why is it a problem?
- Flooding and food shortages are linked as farmland/ crops are destroyed
- Try to link it to local events or possible relevant things that are happening in the news
- Places like South Africa get droughts so make sure to mention that climate change affects everyone differently but it will effect everyone

SLIDE 4

- What causes it?
- Methane is produced by livestock (mainly cows) burping and farting
- Most emissions are done by world superpowers and wealthiest 1%
- Stress that human factors are the vast majority of emissions with natural factors making a tiny percentage

- Net Zero= this is the target that countries are trying to reach, the UK's target for net zero is 2050

- Open it up to the class

- Clean Energy= there is still ongoing debate on hydrogen & nuclear and where they fit into a green future
- Flood defences are adaptive measures against the effects of climate change not preventative ones
